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# PASTORAL LETTER

June 28, 2024

Last Friday, we sent our son to school and told him that he still had two more days of school next week on Monday and Tuesday which we had been told in an email. He called us in a panic at lunchtime to say, "Today is the last day of school!" I was visiting someone at 1:30pm so I knew I had lots of time to run up and get him. He came out of the school with a giant clear bag filled with all of his school supplies and projects, along with his 40-pound rucksack of a school bag. I don't know how kids carry these things. Anyway. Eli was lifting and dropping the bag one step at a time so I said, "Let me carry that, buddy," as I took his school bag too. As we were walking he asked, "Did you bring the car?" Because we only live a few houses down from the school and because there's so much construction work on our street, I said it was easier to walk. That's when the bag broke and all of his papers and supplies went flying. "Dad!" I said, "Don't worry, buddy! We Billard Boys have got this!" Eli replied, "No we don't!" as he chased papers in the grass.

Part of the buzz on Sunday morning was that there was a young man visiting our church. I had gone over to shake his hand and sort of recognized him but I wasn't sure why. He introduced himself to me as Eli LeBlanc. I remembered. (Name associations help me and I knew there was an organist named Eli in the area.) I told him I recognized him from the news. He was pleased. He said. "I've never been in a Protestant church before." I told him we have lots of Catholics who attend here and that he was safe. A church member had met him and invited him to come hear our pipe organ and here he was. "Do you think I could meet your organist?" Of course! I knew Rev. Mel would love to meet Eli as Mel has been such a big advocate for young people and music his whole life. After the service I saw him speaking with Mel and a few others. He had played a few notes on the organ and he enthusiastically said, "If you ever do a fundraiser for this organ, please call me. I'll come play." He made the comment that the best thing for the upkeep of an organ was to play it. Eli planned on visiting other Protestant churches in the coming weeks to hear their pipe organs too.

For the past week I've thought in my head that I was two weeks away from vacation. To my shock, I opened my book to see that I had just one week to complete everything, including writing three presentations for a course for United Church students on worship and a commencement address for the Health Sciences graduates from Oulton College along with my regular duties and obligations.

I spent Monday and Tuesday writing first and second drafts for the course. It was supposed to be a course on Zoom that my colleague, the Rev. Dr. Shawn Redden was leading. Shawn, who recently was the minister at Visions United, invited me to participate because she said when it came to doing weddings, funerals, and nursing home services, "I immediately thought of you!" We'd had a call a few weeks before where she outlined what would be expected of me as I would spend a few hours with the students. I presented on each topic and then we had time for discussion and questions.

When the time came on Wednesday morning, I clicked the link and there they all were sitting in the chapel at the Atlantic School of Theology and I was on a giant screen in the chapel. I have warm memories of the chapel there. When I was a student it was my job to lock up the buildings at night and I always saved the chapel for last so that I could play the piano for a while. It's a beautiful, if not echoey, space! I've had some meaningful moments in worship there, too.

It was an engaging session with the students who are training for leadership in the church. There were lots of questions for me and I tried to communicate the joy of what I do - of what we do - in the church and that I consider it to be sacred and holy work, whether it's standing before a wedding couple; throwing dirt into a grave after writing words to comfort; or standing in the foyer of a busy special care home trying to yell over the staff who are working as the residents sit there that JESUS LOVES YOU.

I encouraged the students to remember that the church still has some power in it and that we are not at the mercy of the wedding industry and the expectations around all of that; that people come to the United Church for funerals when they have had terrible experiences with other pastors and priests who either use the opportunity to save souls or barely even mention the name of the person

who died; and when it comes to care home services that we are about the work of Jesus when we are with people who could use some love, kindness, and sometimes advocacy.

That afternoon, before I started working on my speech for the students and staff at Oultons College, I went for a walk in the warm breeze where I saw "love locks" in the park in front of the old Aberdeen school. I'd had two



phone calls from staff checking in on me to see if I needed anything. One person asked if she could see a copy of my speech ahead of time, which surprised me as I've never had that request before. When I gently asked why I was told that in today's climate things can be misheard and they wanted to avoid any kind of misunderstanding. To be honest, a few years ago I wouldn't have understood that but today I do. It takes just one person saying one thing on video that is posted on Facebook and it can be an unwelcome storm of horribleness for the organization and the speaker. I said, "A second set of eyes never hurts!"

To be completely honest, it was a challenge. As I've said before I never say no to an opportunity to speak in front of people. It's just who I've become. Plus, when I am asked to speak publicly I have this strong belief that it raises our church's profile. I think the church needs to be at all the tables it is invited to no matter how big or small.

I took my task with all the seriousness I could using all the abilities I have to speak for ten minutes without mentioning God or Jesus. I didn't know what to wear because I have never spoken for such an event but I knew I wanted people to hear a different kind of "pastor" (I rarely hear the word

minister these days) than the one they are used to hearing given how conservative Moncton is religiously. So I wore a suit and a clergy shirt even though I did not invoke the holy of holies and made no mention of Christianity at all. I wanted people to see and understand that the church can be sophisticated and compassionate. We didn't need to hammer the name Jesus all the time. In fact, as I reminded someone recently, we say more to people about Jesus by how we live than any amount of preaching can achieve. "You may be the only Bible some people ever read." I was in to have lunch with church members and friends recently and they have a sign on their door that says no fliers or solicitation. I told them given the amount of Rogers sales people and Jehovah's Witnesses lately they should also add onto their sign one I saw years ago that said, "No peddlers of religion."



It occurred to me that day as I watched the students getting their diplomas that the overwhelming narrative is that the world is a terrible place where terrible things happen. But, that day, I felt surrounded by goodness and positive energy. The students were so excited and their teachers were so proud. There were a thousand people there cheering them on. Different cultures were represented. So many people were entering careers in the caring professions. I saw a lot of good. One of the staff members knew and had recently spoken with former Moderator, the Very Rev. Lois Wilson who was the first female Moderator of The United Church of Canada.

On my way out of the venue, I felt like Moses parting the waters. A few people beelined for me and I had to endure the one thing I have tried to relax about: hugs. A gentleman came to speak to me as I was talking to the school President, Darcie Reidpath, and he said, "I can't believe you're from Cape Breton! Some of us got out!" I told him the old line that I had heard that there were only two ways out of Cape Breton: Dorchester or the ministry. He burst out laughing. He was from Sydney. While it was nice to speak to so many students, I mentally noted how many old guys came up to shake my hand. I know clergy are a dying breed these days and people don't have many opportunities to see us out in the field but I made sure to give each and every one a few moments and eye contact and a handshake. I can always tell when that moment means a lot to someone.

I drove down to the church after the ceremony and opened my mail and made some calls. There were two emails from church members excited that I had spoken at the graduation as they have family members who were graduating that day from Oultons. I tried to focus on the next tasks when my phone rang. It was Trina Perkins from Fergusons (formerly Tuttles) Funeral Home.

Lloyd Mallory, the former owner of Tuttles, had just died. I did Lloyd's wife Janet's funeral back in 2012. Janet was the Tuttle and the business had been in the family for generations. Ian Ferguson bought the business the year before and Lloyd was pleased to know that the Tuttles families would be cared for. The family wanted me and asked if they could have the service on Sunday. I said to Trina, "God bless Lloyd. He knew it was the day before I went on vacation and didn't want to bother me. A funeral home director until the end!" Lloyd and I always got along well.



When I go on vacation this summer, it doesn't mean I'm not thinking of the church. In fact, my brain is now wired towards all of you. You know how to find me if need be. I'm excited for the summer as my daughter has music camp at Mount A for a week and we will be going to Cape Breton for a visit. I'm traveling by train to see Dad in Bedford for a few days, which will be good to spend time with him.



My new sister, Jolene MacSween, is getting married and I am performing the ceremony. The whole group of McSweens are descending on Cape Breton for the wedding so I'll get to meet even more of them and spend a few days to visit. Also, I'm excited to be doing my brother's wedding the following weekend in Grand Narrows where our family visited every summer. My uncle had a hotel there that he used as a summer home for his family. There's a long veranda on the front and if I close my eyes I can see all of the people I loved now long gone sitting there and talking on a warm summer evening across the water from the Highland Village in Iona where the Malagawatch proudly stands on the point overlooking the Barra Strait. Jason said that he's considering it a family reunion as it will only be family there. I cannot wait to meet his bride, Maria, and to see my nephew Ethan for the first time since he was the ring bearer at my wedding twenty years ago. Jason's daughter Logan will be there too and we will all be staying at the old hotel for two nights.



Bless you all on these summer days. Thank you for letting me share parts of my life with all of you. As someone said to me recently, "I really love your letters and all of the things you talk about!" I smiled and said, "Just think of the things that happened that I don't include!" She told me that her mother carries the church letter with her and I was deeply moved. I'll mostly be in Moncton during July and hopefully on a beach once in a while too or near a campfire. I return in August to resume my full duties and to finish planning for the Vacation Bible School.
